


ESL 1010 Speaking and Listening is a seven credit core language course in level four of the ESL program at Salt Lake Community College. Students who take the placement examination and place into ESL level four must complete ESL 1010 Speaking and Listening and ESL 1020 Reading and Writing. ESL 1010 is designed 1) to provide students with skills that will assist them in their college studies and 2) to improve students' proficiency in their production and comprehension of the English language.

COURSE GOALS & STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete ESL 1010 Advanced II Speaking and Listening will:

- improve their comprehension of spoken academic English as represented by college lectures.
- improve their oral communication and pronunciation through an analysis of and practice producing accurate phonemes, syllable stress, and intonation.
- learn to identify relevant information in college lectures and take notes that will help them better understand lectures and prepare for exams.
- demonstrate their ability to research and share information on academic subjects by giving well organized and clearly spoken oral presentations.
- expand their vocabulary by attending to lectures and learning how to understand new words within context, by association with synonyms, and by examining the parts of words.
- acquire substantive knowledge on academic subjects by listening to and discussing college lectures, and by researching and delivering their own presentations.
- improve their ability to discuss information and negotiate meaning in spoken English by participating in classroom discussions.



COURSE POLICIES

- 1. **Grade:** To successfully complete this course, a student must have a grade of C (73%) or above. Students who have below a C average should plan on retaking the course.
- 2. **Language:** Students should try to speak only English in class in order to improve their skills. Students who use another language too often may lose points from their final grade.
- 3. **Attendance:** If you miss a classroom assignment or exam, you can only make up the work if you have notified the teacher. I will take attendance every day. You will lose points from your final score if you are absent more than five days. Students who miss class tend to perform poorly on exams. Also, those students who attend regularly and participate in class are more likely to receive bonus points at the end of the term.
- 4. **Assignments:** Each student must take all exams and complete all classroom assignments shown on the schedule below. Late assignments will only receive partial credit.
- 5. **Mobile phones:** Limit the use of mobile phones during class time to emergency use only. Turn your phone off or set it to silent mode while in class. If you receive an emergency phone call, excuse yourself quietly and answer the call outside the classroom. Do NOT talk or text on your phone in the classroom.
- 6. **Electronic devices:** If you wish to bring electronic devices (e.g., computers, iPads, smart phones) to class, you may do so, but only use them for course work. Students who use electronic devices during class time for personal activities, such as playing games, chatting, texting, or surfing the Internet will lose points. Also, you CANNOT use such devices during the exams.
- 7. **Materials:** Bring the textbook, a notebook, a pen, and a dictionary with you to class everyday. You may use an online dictionary for coursework, but remember that you cannot use any electronic devices during tests. For tests, you will need a printed dictionary.
- 8. **Student Code of Conduct:** As a student of Salt Lake Community College, you are expected to follow the rules for appropriate and honest behavior in class and on the campus. Academic dishonesty includes among other things cheating on tests, giving another student answers during a test, plagiarism, and copying the work of another student.
